

The Laying of Wreaths

Members of the Armed Forces and Associations, Civic and Community Groups, Churches and Service Organisations, Businesses, Schools and Members of the Public will be called out in turn to lay their wreaths and pay their respects.

During the Laying of Wreaths, the names of the Servicemen recorded on the War Memorial will be read out: 62 from World War I and 54 from World War II.

After the last wreath has been laid, the Kohima Epitaph is said:

When you go home, tell them of us and say: For your tomorrow we gave our today.

Today, many people around the world will observe two minutes silence. Have you ever wondered what goes through other people's minds for those two minutes? For older people, there may be memories of wartime; for younger people, questions about why we continue this practice. However, it is, for all of us, an opportunity to pray quietly: for those who were bereaved through war; for those who still suffer because of war; for the present areas of trouble in the world; and for peace. Younger people might like to think about the sadness of war, boys and girls who have been made orphans by war and by thanking God for the peace we have today.

Remembering

Let us remember before God the men and women of all nations who have died as a result of war; those whom we have known and whose memory we treasure; those we never knew; and those who died unknown. We will remember all who have lived in hope but died in vain; the tortured; the innocent; the starving; the exiled; the imprisoned; the oppressed; and the disappeared. Eternal God, holy and true, holy and compassionate: we remember before You those who have made profound sacrifices so that we may live in peace and freedom; those who gave their lives in overcoming evil; those who give their lives in maintaining peace; those who mourn the loved ones they have lost; and those who bear the scars that never heal.
