Younger people might like to think about the sadness of war, boys and girls who have been made orphans by war and by thanking God for the peace we have today.

Let us remember before God the men and women of all nations who have died as a result of war; those whom we have known and whose memory we treasure; those we never knew; and those who died unknown. We will remember all who have lived in hope but died in vain; the tortured; the innocent; the starving; the exiled; the imprisoned; the oppressed; and the disappeared. Eternal God, holy and true, holy and compassionate: we remember before You those who have made profound sacrifices so that we may live in peace and freedom; those who gave their lives in overcoming evil; those who give their lives in maintaining peace; those who mourn the loved ones they have lost; and those who bear the scars that never heal.

They shall grow not old, as we who are left grow old; Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them.
